

# I've Been Framed

Connie Harris Farrington of Queensbury, NY has been quilting for decades. Her most recent quilts have been two-sided, humorous, and focused on some rather quirky ladies. In 2014 she completed "I've Been Framed", featuring 18 American women who were arrested for a variety of crimes. All of the women are cut from commercial fabrics and machine appliqued. Each is "framed" in a combination of print fabrics and material that Connie hand-dyes and hand-letters with fabric inks. Since she hand quilts with a large "primitive" stitch, she typically finishes only one quilt a year. This quilt is 72" wide by 88" long.

The array of ladies goes back as far as 1692 when Sarah Goode was hanged as a witch. And it comes up as close as Martha Stewart's arrest in 2004 for obstruction of justice. On the way we see such women as Lizzie Borden, Leona Helmsley, Tokyo Rose, Carrie Nation, Rosa Parks and Tanya Harding, all portrayed whimsically. The border highlights 13 sing-song-y crimes appliqued in gray ulltrasuede.

The reverse side tells the poignant story of "The Framing of Anne Hutchinson", a history-changing event. Anne was banished from the Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1638 for heresy after allowing discussions of "inner faith" in her home. Later she fled from Rhode Island to Westchester County, NY where she and 14 members of her family were scalped in 1643. Her life and death played a large part in the framing of the First Amendment rights of freedom of speech and religion. Her life was celebrated in the naming of NY's Hutchinson River Bridge and Hutchinson River Parkway.

Connie's quilts have won prizes in many national competitions and appeared in several magazines. She is a professional genealogist and has 3 large organic vegetable gardens. Connie is a graduate of Yale Divinity School and lectures on quilts.

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

# Quilt Guild to the Rescue By Rev. Diane Mettam

When my husband and I moved to Eureka I felt blessed to find a quilt guild. What I didn't realize was how big a blessing this quilt guild would be.


As a Methodist minister I believe in a life of service. So does the Redwood Empire Quilt Guild. Each year we donate more than 200 quilts to Hospice, the North Coast Veterans Program, Dialysis Center, North Coast Children's Services, and the Red Cross. In addition, we donate approximately 300 doll quilts to the Salvation Army and Toys for Tots to be distributed to children at Christmas. A quilt is part of each doll and stuffed animal toy given by Santa, to develop a sense of nurture and care for the toy. Guild members can check out cut-out quilts to piece together, finished quilts that needs bindings sewn, or pieced tops that need to be quilted, and return them as they are finished.

What is a quilt guild without education? We are fortunate to bring in educators of national renown to lead workshops and speak to our guild members In May Laura Nownes taught a class on her popular "Spoolin' Around" quilt and gave a talk and trunk show at our monthly meeting. She was a delight, and a kind and patient teacher. In November Tracey Brookshier taught two classes - her popular "Beyond Bento Box" and "Butterfly Town" patterns - and spoke to the Guild about "Quilting is BIG Business."

And of course a quilt guild means fun. Each month we have a fat quarter exchange and a block-of-the-month exchange, each with a theme chosen by their coordinator. We also have a raffle table full of treasures donated by members, and an extensive library of books, videos and magazines loaned free of charge. There is a social gathering before each meeting, with delicious food and drink. And we have Show and Tell, where we are all free to show off what we have been working on, and receive the admiration of our fellow quilters and fiber artists (one of our members is actually a dollmaker, not a quilter). What I appreciate is that everyone, from the most experienced quilter to the newest beginner, can find a place in the Guild and feel appreciated.

Every other year we host a quilt show, and that is what we are gearing up for in 2015. More than 300 quilts will be on display, along with our opportunity quilt, Brilliance, which was a labor of love among many guild members. It will be raffled off as a highlight of the show. My husband and I attended the show for the first time last year, and were astounded by the breadth of the show, which allowed for displays of quilts in mini "rooms" of different themes, techniques, color schemes, and other motifs.

Finding a home at the Redwood Empire Quilters Guild has been a real blessing that will keep me occupied for many years.

I have been contracted to administrate the Fantastic Fibers 2015 International Juried Exhibit which will be on display April 11-June 6, 2015 at Yeiser Art Center.

Fantastic Fibers 2015 (FF2015) is an annual international juried exhibition that seeks to showcase a wide range of outstanding works related to the fiber medium. FF2015 is currently in the <u>Call for Entry</u> stage and would very much like to extend an invitation for the Rotarian Fellowship of Quilters & Fiber Artists to submit their work for this engaging and innovative exhibit. <u>The submission deadline date for Fantastic Fibers 2015 is February 21 - there is still time to apply. The Paducah Rotary Antique Quilt Show and Yeiser Art Center's FF2015 are both American Quilter's Society sanctioned events, which means that selected works will be seen by tens of thousands of viewers as more than 30,000 visitors from across the globe attend AQS QuiltWeek in Paducah. This year's AQS QuiltWeek dates are April 22-25, 2015.</u>
