This fellowship is an avenue of providing help to those in need, such as: tactile quilts for the blind, warm quilts for children who are in the care of social services because of neglect or abuse, and quilts or fabric toys to comfort children in countries that have experienced war, famine or other disasters. Over the years the Fellowship has raised about 130.000\$ for the End Polio Now campain, since 2005.

The Newsletter is published quarterly and includes images, articles and news from and about members work.

Greetings ALL!



Bindifestivalen in the Faroe Islands

The Faroe Islands are Iceland's little sister. We love them dearly and really love to visit.

To visit the islands is like stepping back in time. You find sheep and chicken everywhere, lots of knitting shops, very friendly people who can actually understand most of what you say in Icelandic:) and most speak English as well.




Every year there is a knitting festival in Fuglafjörður - a small fjord with 1600 inhabitants. They offer lots of seminars, knitting

cafes, lovely food, knitting and walking while listening to the history of Fuglafjörður and also peace and quiet. I went there with a group of 33 women, all loving yarn and knitting. Stranded knitting is the Faroese way of knitting. The seaman's sweaters were always patterned and therefore mostly double, from strong wool. Patterns vary but the yarn is only in natural colours, black, grey, brown and white. I decided to have to classes only in Vattarsaumur (naalbinding) as this is something I "need" to brush up on.

The Faroese are a friendly people and we were invited into two homes where the families had put their lovely

china to the tables and either cooked or made cakes for us. Imagine a world where over 30 people can come to your home, you just put the dishes, cups and cutlery on

all available tables and then feed them! All with homemade/homebaked goods. local cheese and lovely coffee or tea. Of course all tap water is drinkable and very good.

the old ways of doing so. Imagine to have this to look at whenever you look out of your liv



And why would you put the goods in over the weekend even if the shop is closed? Just keep them outside (a flower shop in Thorshavn on a Sunday afternoon).





I highly recommend visiting the Faroe Islands. Just be aware of the opening times of shops (closed on Sunday, close early the other days - time with friends and family comes first for the Faroese people.
